2024 Public Art: Train Sculpture Created by Artist Ivan Iler

Depot Trail Head Park 908 E. Maple Street



Festival of the Arts has a tradition of adding a new piece of public art to the Big Rapids community each year. For our 2024 piece, artist Ivan Iler was commissioned to create a work that will be located at the new Depot Trail Head Park at the old railroad depot on E. Maple Street. Park completion and art installation is hoped to be complete by August 2024.

"When I was first approached with the idea of adding a sculpture to this location, I immediately started researching the history of the town, and I went out to see the area this sculpture would be located at. I spent some time thinking about how I could pay homage to this town's rich history and give a nod to the beautiful historical railroad station.

"I knew I wanted to create something more unique than a run-of-the-mill train sculpture, so I got my gears turning and thought 'wouldn't it be wonderful to use an actual train wheel as the centerpiece of this sculpture?' From there, the rest fell in to place.

"One of the things that's beautiful about a train is that everything is exposed and you can see the workings of it from the exterior, so that's what I really wanted to emulate - the beauty of the mechanical structure of a train. I created a slightly abstract design that included smooth lines that curved and crossed in ways that imitated the beauty and functionality of the train wheel without overpowering it.

"I love this town and am honored to have already had one sculpture of mine placed here, so I am really looking forward to bringing a slightly different style with the same amount of thought and care put into it for this next piece."

Telling Our Stories: The Old Settlers 2024 Artworks Festival Exhibit

The exhibits at Artworks in 2024 all involve storytelling in one way or another. This exhibit, which runs through the month of February, tells the stories of the Old Settlers.

The Old Settlers were the African American pioneer settlers who arrived in Michigan beginning in 1860 prior to the ratification of the Thirteenth Amendment abolishing slavery in the U.S. Settlers came to Michigan because of the Homestead Act (1862), allowing each settler 160 acres of land. James Guy was the first Black settler in Mecosta County, and his deed was signed by Abraham Lincoln. He

obtained 160 acres in Wheatland Township on May 30, 1861. By 1873, African Americans owned 1,392 acres in the three counties of Isabella, Mecosta, and Montcalm. In the 1860s, most of the land in Remus and Millbrook was owned by the Old Settlers.

The Old Settlers Reunion Website, which evolved from a printed history book from 1988, is an initiative for a more inclusive telling of history, a history in which African American participation is included and valued. The story of the Old Settlers is an important one that many are unaware of and one that some people continue to dispute. This exhibit is an opportunity to take information and artifacts from the Old Settlers Reunion Website and make them tangible and accessible to our community.

Much Ado About Barbie

Barbie's cultural significance is a complex reflection of the everchanging values and attitudes of our society. She has influenced culture and sparked discussion on gender, body image, consumerism, and feminism. Her status as a pop culture icon has grown to unimaginable measure following the release of the major motion picture *Barbie* (2023) starring Margot Robbie and Ryan Gosling. The film is the highest earning film in Warner Brothers' 100-year history and the highest grossing film ever directed by a female filmmaker (Greta Gerwig).

Much Ado About Barbie aims to celebrate the impact of the recent film and to explore the evolution of Barbie since her introduction by Mattel in 1959. Barbie represents both progress and controversy as her character has evolved over time to address the criticisms and changing societal norms of Western culture while remaining a symbol of imagination and aspiration for generations.

FOTA 2024 Opening Concert Presented by The Rollie Tussing Trio

The 2024 Big Rapids Festival of the Arts opens with an evening of classic and country blues, featuring the Rollie Tussing Trio. Following opening remarks by Ferris State University President Bill Pink, Rollie and his trio will take the stage for an unforgettable evening of music. After the concert, be sure to stay for refreshments and an opportunity

to meet the musicians, FOTA board members, and fellow arts enthusiasts!

"Award winning finger-style guitarist Rollie Tussing performs timeless classic and country blues, dewey-eyed tunes of the 20s, as well as godforsaken songs of the nineteenth century. His own compositions are influenced by those same lonesome, haunted and abandoned melodies that we all forgot to remember." Based in Michigan, Rollie's trio features Ross Huff on trumpet and Serge Van der Voo on bass.

The concert will feature some of Rollie's original songs and instrumentals, as well as some classic and unknown oldies from the early days of recording — songs that cover everything from old time, hillbilly, and vaudeville, putting his own modern interpretation on them but, importantly, never losing sight of where the songs came from, ensuring they are still recognizable.

While Tussing's guitar playing is extraordinary, he also possesses vocal chords that have warmth and a clarity that lends itself to the songs, old and new, allowing the borders to blend to such a degree that the uninitiated would not know the old from the new. There is a subtlety and originality to the playing of Van der Voo and Huff that blends perfectly with Tussing's guitar and vocals, giving the sparse instrumentation a depth that highlights the strength of each and every song, while imbuing them with their own style and original take.

Quilts of Valor Foundation began in 2003 with a dream, literally a dream. Founder Catherine Roberts' son Nat was deployed in Iraq. From the beginning, she had definite ideas about standards of excellence for Quilts of Valor:

I knew a Quilt of Valor had to be a quality-made quilt, not a "charity quilt." Quilts of Valor would be the civilian equivalent of a Purple Heart award. A Quilt of Valor had to be quilted, not tied, which meant hand or machine quilting. Quilts of Valor would be "awarded," not just passed out like magazines or videos. A Quilt of Valor would say unequivocally, "Thank you for your service, sacrifice, and valor in serving our nation in combat."

Anyone wishing to participate is welcome. Quilting will take place all day at the Old Jail. Join in the quilting or just stop by and watch the quilters make their magic. The quilts that are produced will be presented to local veterans, with one such presentation taking place at 2:00pm as part of the Sew Day activities.



A salon, based on the French word for living room, is a conversational gathering of intellectuals, artists, and politicians. The salon was a fixture among artists from all disciplines in the late 1800s, continuing through the early 1900s. In 19th-century France, the Salon was the official annual art exhibition. This is where all of the greatest artists of the day would show off their

work, and where French society would gather to debate art and culture. Over time, salons evolved into arts and humanities gatherings, mostly informal, where musicians, writers, visual artists, playwrights, and others would share their works.

Artworks is hosting a Salon Series throughout 2024, and this first one is dedicated to a 50-year period illuminating significant music composed and performed from 1917 - 1967. Music will include works by Bizet, Prokofiev, and Shostakovich. Performers under discussion will include Maria Callas, Vladimir Horowitz, and Yuja Wang. Pianist Ric Underhile, Executive Director of Artworks, will host this session, playing excerpts and offering interpretive commentary. Ric Underhile holds degrees in music and education.

Future Artworks Salons in 2024 will feature visual and theater arts from the same period. Each salon is intended to be informational and interactive. These events are free of charge, but donations to support future programming are welcome.

Schindler's List - Movie and Panel Discussion Presented by FSU Shoah Committee

Schindler's List, celebrating its 30-year anniversary, is an epic historical drama directed and produced by Steven Spielberg, set during the German Holocaust. The screenplay is based on Thomas Keneally's 1982 novel Schindler's Ark, and follows the story of how German industrialist Oskar Schindler saved over a thousand Polish-Jewish refugees. The film stars Liam Neeson as Oskar Schindler, Ben Kingsley as Itzhak Stern, Ralph Fiennes as Amon Göth, and Caroline Goodall as Emilie Schindler.

Through the generosity of Detroit area businessman and real estate developer Mickey Shapiro - a child of Holocaust survivors who began his college career at

Ferris State University - Ferris State University has acquired full access to the USC Shoah Foundation's Visual History Archive, founded by Steven Spielberg in the aftermath of *Schindler's List*. With this acquisition, Ferris becomes only the third institution in Michigan and the 53rd in the world to have access to a streaming video collection of more than 55,000 primary source testimonies of survivors and witnesses of the Holocaust and other genocides from 65 countries around the world.

Ferris State University's Shoah Visual Archive Project will hold a discussion following a showing of the film.



Great Lakes HummerNet Project Presented by Allen Chartier

In Autumn 2001, the Great Lakes HummerNet was formed by Allen Chartier, primarily to learn more about hummingbirds in the Great Lakes region, focusing on Ruby-throated Hummingbirds in Michigan by enlisting the help of volunteer observers throughout the region. Data is gathered through observation as well as banding studies. Other species of humming-bird that occur as "vagrants" are also studied.

This presentation will describe the research objectives of the project, tell you how you can participate, provide helpful hints on how to attract and feed hummingbirds, provide hummingbird gardening tips, and review what has been learned so far. It will also review the status of other species of hummingbird confirmed to occur in the region.

Allen Chartier has been interested in science and nature since he was five years old, and began birdwatching when he was eleven. He has been on birding trips to 28 countries with his wife Nancy, and they have birded in all 50 U.S. states.


